Message from the Executive Director Successes & Challenges

2023 was full of fun, learning, laughter, and new friends. In the past year, HFRC was humbled to host 801 unique families at our two centers with an average of over 250 people participating in our programs per week! We have seen growth in children's school readiness and watched families make friends, try new things, and explore resources in our community. We are so grateful for all the support we have received from the families we serve, and from the community at large.

The HFRC staff and board worked hard last year to bring meaningful and needed programs to our community that increase school readiness, support informed parenting, and strengthen community relationships. Almost all HFRC programs include a literacy component, such as reading books to children or sending books home with families. Program enhancements, like our Story, Craft, and Snack programs, encourage children to try new foods, explore textures, and increase fine motor skills through crafts and activities.

The diversity of our spaces, from the church playroom and gym to the Arnot Mall playroom, allows families to play in multiple environments with toys and spaces that encourage gross motor skill building, creative play, executive function skills, and social-emotional connections. HFRC also branched out of our locations to take on some new projects including the Summer Lunch Program hosted at Thorne Street Park in Horseheads. This program provided free meals for children 18 and younger for 7 weeks in the summer while school was not in session and had the goal of combating summer food insecurity in our community.

The Summer Lunch Program was a huge undertaking for our organization, and we worked hard to partner with other community organizations to make it so much more than just "free food." Instead, every day we watched an empty park become a place for families to come together. We saw the Family Reading Partnership put a book into the hands of children who then sat under the trees reading! We watched pre-teens create a friend group who were eager to make it to lunch each day to spend time together. The benefits of this program cannot be overstated and was truly one of the most rewarding things that we have done.

HFRC also experienced challenges including the ever-rising cost of doing business. With so many families visiting us every week, cleaning was a top priority. We incurred higher costs for labor and supplies to keep our rooms sparkling and stocked with snacks, paper products, and art materials. Additionally, the Supervised Visit Program continued to have issues with families' consistency, a high cancellation rate, and more demands for staff time in court. Overall, these challenges were easily managed and we continue to learn from any obstacles in our path.

HFRC is overwhelmingly grateful for all of the support that we receive and cannot wait to see what 2024 holds!

Our Vision

The Horseheads Family Resource Center envisions communities that recognize, support, and celebrate the role that parents and caregivers play in their children's development and well-being.

Our Mission

The Horseheads Family Resource Center provides inclusive, strength-based programs for young children and their families that increase school readiness, support informed parenting, and strengthen community relationships.

Our Values

Safety

We provide safe, clean, and facilitated environments where all families can play and learn together. Our programs support families' physical and emotional wellbeing.

Respect

We welcome, accept, and respect all cultures, races, family structures, and abilities. Staff and families treat each other with respect. Our diversity is an asset that we celebrate.

Empowerment

We recognize and support the strengths inherent in each family and child.

Learning

We partner with families in promoting school-readiness skills such as following group rules, taking turns, using language, making friends, respecting others and property, using art materials, using large and fine motor skills, and putting toys and materials away. Staff members share resources and information about programs in our area.

Accessibility

We are centrally located and easily accessible by car or bus. We work to minimize physical and financial barriers to participation. All our programs are offered free of charge.

Our Responsibility

We depend on donations and grants and are committed to being fiscally responsible. The HFRC welcomes all feedback and works toward continuous improvement.

All HFRC Programs are free and open to all!

Programs

Playful Learning Program

The Playful Learning Program (PLP) offers year-round drop-in play and learning opportunities during daytime, evening, and weekend hours. Our two locations offer a variety of toys and materials for creative play and an assortment of climbing structures and riding toys for physical play. During PLP, families engage together in developmentally appropriate play that supports school-readiness skills. As always, parents and caregivers are able to ask HFRC staff members questions about childrearing, skills for school success, child development, and referrals to other agencies and programs.

Stroller Walk

Stroller Walks give families the welcomed opportunity to be active and social, which promotes healthy habits



throughout the year and helps develop networks among families. Babies, toddlers, and school-age children, with their parents or caregivers, join us for weekly walks at various local, stroller-friendly parks. During the winter, the walks are held indoors at the Arnot Mall.

"I bring the little girl I babysit to music and movement. It's been so good for her. She asks for me to play the songs at my house all day now."

Supervised Visitation



The HFRC provides this service to families who need supervised visits as a result of a Family Court order or due to a Department of Child and Family Services intervention.

During visits, children play and bond with their non-custodial parents in our safe, fun, child-friendly environment. We provide a trained monitor to supervise and support families by modeling positive interactions, assisting with transitions, and being available for questions. This is a much-needed service in our community, with the need exceeding the supply. With half of the families enrolled in the HFRC's Supervised Visit Program being below the poverty guideline, the fact that the HFRC offers these visits for no charge is significant.

Music & Movement

Music & Movement is an engaging small-group class that incorporates a variety of fun activities that assist in the development of speech and motor skills. Children in this program learn through their sensory systems utilizing touch, hearing, vision, movement, communication, breathing, and body awareness.

Parents and caregivers can sometimes feel isolated or resistant to participating in group activities with their children, especially if they have developmental challenges. Music & Movement engages parents and promotes participation and facilitation of play with their child while building confidence through an atmosphere of acceptance and friendship and through watching their child learn and grow!

Literacy Programs

Bright Red Bookshelf

The HFRC partners with the Family Reading Partnership of Chemung Valley to recirculate gently used books that we display on the "Bright Red Bookshelves" at both of our locations. Children are encouraged to take a book home with them, promoting literacy and book ownership, particularly in lower-income homes, while also encouraging parent-child bonding. During 2023, children took home 2,712 books from the HFRC's Bright Red Bookshelves.

Bookmobile

The Chemung County Library Bookmobile visits the HFRC twice a month during the school year. It is a great opportunity for families to borrow or return books even if they cannot get to the library. The librarian always has wonderful recommendations and children (5 and over) can get a library card right on the bus!

Child Development & Parenting Programs

C.I.D.S Developmental Screenings

C.I.D.S. (Comprehensive Interdisciplinary Developmental Services) offers drop-in developmental screenings at the HFRC to assess vision, speech, language, gross motor, fine motor, hearing, and social development. The C.I.D.S. team has information for parents regarding developmental issues and can provide referrals if requested.

Baby Bistro

Twin Tiers Breastfeeding Network offers their popular "Baby Bistro" at the HFRC allowing families to meet each other, ask lactation specialists questions, learn about breastfeeding topics, and help support other moms.

Playful Parenting

Kelly Bartle-Bush is a play therapist who leads parents and children through activities and gives information about strengthening bonds, regulating emotions, and other parenting skills and tactics. There is a new topic of focus each month. All families are welcome, children are encouraged to attend with their parents or caregiver, and registration is not required.

Program Enhancements

Story, Craft, & Snack

HFRC offers at least one drop-in program enhancement per week which is themed and includes a story, craft, and snack. These programs are great at engaging families, introducing literacy, and helping children explore new foods, textures, and activities.

Beyond the Numbers

HFRC is so proud of the numbers we saw in 2023 and is continually surprised by how our centers keep growing! With over 800 unique families participating in our programs, we have had to work hard to keep up with this new pace of over 250 people visiting HFRC each week. HFRC staff members are making sure that families are getting the attention they need and that our spaces are always clean, comfortable, and welcoming for everyone. Our growing attendance has increased our needs when it comes to staffing and consumable supplies and HFRC continues to work with funders to make sure that our centers are stocked and kept to the best possible standard.

HFRC also took on a brand-new project in 2023, hosting a Summer Lunch Program site at Thorne Street Park. This program was very successful with over 2,300 free lunches served to children in our community in just 7 weeks. We were also able to introduce families to other community resources and help families connect with each other.

Survey Results

In October HFRC conducted its annual survey of families at our centers. This year we had more responses than ever with 120 participants taking the survey.



When families were asked to rate their experience at HFRC from 1-10 our average rating was 9.7!




